This work of art by Dipak Banerjee is rooted in a larger allegory of luminosity—both in terms of the canvas treatment and in the realm of our interpretation of cosmic unity/oneness. It's very detailed as one can feel the delicate and fragile handling of the brushstrokes as this piece is inundated with symbolism that reveals itself after a careful look.While the use of bold crimson colour as a bordering element anchors the composition.

F N Souza

This 1993 acrylic by F.N. Souza is a striking blend of abstraction and figurative forms. Souza's signature thick black outlines define distorted human figures in a vibrant landscape. Earthy tones of green and brown contrast with a bright blue sky, creating depth. The central figure's dynamic pose, with arms outstretched, suggests motion and emotion. Souza's exploration of form and identity is evident, capturing a raw, primal energy that transcends traditional representation.





In Ganesh Haloi's evocative paintings, each stroke and hue is a living "happening," a profound dialogue with the artist's subjective truth. Rooted in the green landscapes of Bangladesh, left behind during the partition, these canvases serve as a visceral connection to Haloi's past. The depiction of minute trees, deeply rooted within the artist's psyche even after decades, becomes a testament to the enduring power of memory and the profound impact of one's ancestral homeland.

Ganesh Pyne's drawing on grid paper is a labyrinthine exploration of introspection and critique. The cluttered yet deliberate strokes capture a bearded figure, evoking the contemplative presence of a prolific figure, amidst a series of enigmatic sketches. This artwork serves as Pyne's subtle commentary on socio-cultural phenomena and invites viewers to enter a maze of thought where the retreat is impossible, emphasising the inexorable journey of artistic creation.

Dominated by a contemplative figure and mysterious scenes, this artwork delves into themes of identity, solitude, and perception that identify with the Indian epic Mahabharata.

The soft palette of earthy tones, paired with bold, decisive strokes, creates a textured background that enriches the scene's emotional depth. This artwork captures a gentle harmony between the girl and the bird, inviting viewers into a quiet moment of inner peace and connection—a vision of calm that reflects the spiritual undertones of Santosh's evolving aesthetic.

The low-key backdrop contrasts with greens and yellows to articulate a vivacious mood and a satiating contrast. The artist's diligence in expansive as well as mellow texture and native forms brings movement to the scene, inviting viewers to participate in the cheerful mood of the season, when creatures rejoice and cohabitate with the environment with maturation and nourishment.

This minimalistic yet profound artwork features a whirling dervish, capturing the essence of Sufi mysticism. The flowing lines of the figure in motion convey a sense of ecstatic spirituality, while the warm copper background adds a divine glow. The inscription, "Be still mind, let the Dervishes whirl," reflects the duality of spiritual practice: the quiet mind balanced by the dervish's dynamic dance. Radiating calm within movement, this piece beautifully expresses inner peace through devotion.

Unique and significant, the creative representation by Seema Kohli poignantly corresponds with the form of a wheel, which traditionally denotes a cyclical process of life on earth. Fragmenting in multiple sections, each section portrays diverse poses that show a sequential process of attaining the oneness. Through colors, Seema attempts to represent emotion, illustrating female energy either in orange flames or seated in a meditative pose. Moreover, the circular frame of the painting adds a holistic meaning, encompassing spirituality and aspirations.

Thota Vaikuntam

Thota Vaikuntam frequently uses Telangana women as subjects for his artwork. The preoccupation can be linked to his early fascination with the male actors who would portray female characters in the travelling theatre-troupe performances held in his village. He acknowledges that he merely tries to depict the vibrancy of these woman. Before tackling his colourful, big canvases, Thota Vaikuntam's studies were supported by these pictures of local women from his area. Vaikuntam is exceptional in how he depicts the bottu and the turmeric-sandal-stained foreheads of Telangana women.





Thota Vaikuntam's charcoal drawing emerges with a solemn persona marked by convoluted strings and stylized segments. The hushed, contemplative expression captures the crux of definitive pastoral life, reminiscing Vaikuntam's resonance with his Telangana roots. His masterful shading techniques and attention to detail create a robust chasm. blending simplicity with a rich cultural identity. This piece is a testament to Vaikuntam's ability to capture the human spirit and cultural heritage in a singular, evocative image.
