An exploration of life's perpetuity, chaos and serenity as the composition excels in a visual voyage of shapes and form, Devesh Goswami's abstract meanders through the regular and irregulars of the moment. It is replete with organic forms and a kaleidoscope of hues that merge to re-identify themselves. The unpredictable nature of infinite carnage is explored through splashes of amoebic forms, whirling vortices, and explosions of colour.

Souza's portraits delve deep into modernist expressionism, delivering profound social commentaries that unmask the fragility and hypocrisy of society. These otherworldly and slightly grotesque artworks inspire profound contemplation and reflection. In this artwork, Souza utilizes a sap green background with black undertones. White is strategically employed to accentuate the outlines and teeth of the portrait, creating a vivid fauvist color palette with attention to outlines.




Ganesh Haloi

Rooted in a lifelong connection to riverine landscapes, Haloi conjures an immersive underwater world where sustenance and spirit flow as one. Growing up where rivers shaped livelihood and memory, his work honors unseen life beneath. Hazy greens and muted yellows evoke filtered light under surfaces, where life drifts gently. Scattered triangular forms suggest fish schools symbols of sustenance, community, and rhythm. Layered textures mirror vegetation and silt, while faint white marks ripple like currents. Through this dreamlike realm, Haloi celebrates rivers' life-giving spirit that nourishes land and soul.





This rare 1956 work captures G.R. Santosh before his shift to modernist Tantra, depicting Kashmiri tradesmen in a Cubist-Expressionist style. With rhythmic contours, textured surfaces, and paletteknife technique, it bridges European modernism and local life. Exceedingly rare, this figurative piece marks his transitional phase from material to spiritual. For collectors, it is not just a precursor but a landmark of postindependence Indian art, revealing Santosh's evolution at a transformative cusp.

GR Santosh's artwork flows with the course of painterly and subtle brush strokes and colours, meandering the route like a stream on the flat ground unaware of the next turn and only remaining a witness to the act. Santosh's abstract experiments demand a viewer to gaze at the texture and direction of the tone instead of perceiving them in their totality. Evocative and spontaneous, his colour field splash and form invite viewers to explore the depths of their consciousness and infinite fluidity.

Manoj Dutta's domestic tableau reflects the introspection of rural womanhood through symbolic details. A mirror reveals layered identity, while lamp and window evoke modest interiors. A red plant suggests growth, scattered objects trace rituals, and intricate details—blouse, border, green wall—lovingly preserve everyday life. Dutta transforms these elements into a contemplative, symbolic space with tender visual language.

Shanti Dave's works were based on modernism, which can be seen through his formal abstraction technique. The colours are vibrant and subtle, evoking a sense of mystery, and the calligraphy, arranged in an obscure way, became central to the composition of the muralist Shanti Dave, who combined western expressionism with Indian metaphysics. This work also carries impressions from the early years, as the artist worked as a commercial artist doing banners and sign boards at the start of his career.

Shanti Dave uses layers of oil and encaustic paint that are sensitively textured to combine calligraphy with expressionist fervour in his artwork. Influenced by Devanagari and Nepalese scripts, his unique calligraphic strokes give the piece an aura of old mystery. Dave's distinctive fusion of visual art and the spirit of the written word is evident in the rich narrative tapestry that he creates in the painting using bold and expressive lines.




Raza masterfully captures the tactile essence of colors through intuitive abstraction in this majestic piece. He employs a vibrant palette—red and orange for growth, yellows for fiery energy, black for the skies. The lower section reveals sacred geometry, where upright and inverted triangles symbolize creation, echoing purusha-prakriti philosophies. Raza's fascination with Indian mysticism birthed geometric abstraction with neo-tantric influences, beautifully exemplified here.

The composition radiates togetherness, celebrating timeless teachings and the spiritual aura central to Vaikuntam's vision.
